CONTEXT, OBJECTIVES AND METHODOLOGY

Leger was commissioned by FAIRVOTE Canada to conduct a study among Canadians in order to evaluate their opinion on proportional representation in Canada.

To do so, a **Web survey** was conducted from **September 4**th **to September 6**th, **2020** among **1,529 English and French-speaking Canadians**, 18 years of age or older.

Using data from Statistics Canada, results were weighted according to gender, age, region, mother tongue, education and presence of minor children in the household in order to ensure a representative sample of the entire population under review.

For comparison purposes, a probability sample of 1,529 respondents would have a margin of error of \pm 2.5%, 19 times out of 20.


- The numbers presented in this report have been rounded out and their sum (based on the actual numbers before rounding) might not correspond to the manual addition of rounded numbers.



















